



Ambassador Ruth A. Davis Obituary

May 28, 1943 – May 3, 2025



Ambassador Ruth A. Davis, daughter of the late Anderson and Edith Mallett Davis, was born May 28, 1943 in Phoenix, Arizona where her father was on military assignment. She grew up in Atlanta, Georgia, and graduated with honors from Booker T. Washington High School and as Summa Cum Laude from Spelman College. At Spelman, she was awarded the Merrill Scholarship which financed 15 months of study and travel abroad in Europe. She earned a Master's Degree in Social Welfare from the University of California at Berkeley and holds Honorary Doctorates from Spelman and Middlebury colleges.

Ambassador Davis entered the U.S. Foreign Service in 1969 and retired in 2009. Specializing in American Citizen's Services and Visa Issues, she served in Kinshasa, Zaire (now the Democratic Republic of the Congo); Nairobi, Kenya; Tokyo, Japan, Naples, Italy; Barcelona, Spain as U.S. Consul General and as Ambassador to the Republic of Benin where she championed girl's education and contributed to the development of the institutions necessary for creating a democracy in Benin.

Davis achieved a long list of "firsts" during her 40-year career. She was the first African American to serve as Director of the Foreign Service Institute (FSI) that trains Foreign and Civil Service State Department employees for diplomatic service domestically and overseas. At FSI she was founder of the School of Leadership and Management and FSI named the Director's conference room in her honor; the first African American Senior Watch Officer in the Operations Center that monitors current events worldwide; and was the first African




American female Director General of the Foreign Service responsible for 40,000 employees scattered throughout the world; she was a Career Ambassador and upon retirement was the highest-ranking U.S. Foreign Service Officer. Her dedication to mentoring is legendary as is her work on Diversity and Inclusion in the international arena. She was revered as a powerful speaker and her essential work in securing the 1996 Olympic Games for Atlanta.

After retirement Davis was the first African American to be selected for The American Foreign Service Association's coveted Lifetime Contributions to American Diplomacy Award. She remained active in women's empowerment issues as the Founding Chair of the International Women's Entrepreneurial Challenge (IWEC); as the Founding and Serving Global Co-Chair of ACE Health Foundation's ACE Global Leaders of Excellence Network; as former Chair of the International Mission of Mercy USA (IMMUSA) and the Vice President of the Association of Black American Ambassadors (ABAA). She was a member of the Board of Visitors of the Defense Language Institute, Monterey, CA, the Board of the Diplomacy Center Foundation, and a member of the 16th and Decatur Church of Christ, Washington D.C.

She is survived by her sister Dr. Eugenia Davis, her niece Malaika Billups, Esquire, her husband Kenneth III and grand-nieces Ava and Ivy Billups; her nephew Austin Clements, his wife Crystal and son Chase; her Aunt Ida B. McCullough and a number of cousins and many friends both domestic and international.









In Memory of Ambassador Ruth H. Davis

WHEREAS, today, we pay tribute to the life and legacy of Ambassador Ruth A. Davis, a longtime Washington, DC resident, exemplary public servant, and a trailblazer who made history during her remarkable 40-year career with the U.S. Department of State; and

WHEREAS, Ambassador Davis joined the U.S. Foreign Service (FS) in 1969, achieving the highest FS rank of "Career Ambassador" and becoming the first and only African American woman to do so; and

WHEREAS, she was first assigned as Consular Officer in Zaire (now the Democratic Republic of the Congo), expanded her diplomatic portfolio by serving in Kenya, Japan, Italy, and Spain, and later became the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Benin, where she helped the Beninese create the structures needed for democracy; and

WHEREAS, after her overseas assignments, Ambassador Davis returned to Washington as a Pearson Fellow, working as a Special Advisor for International Affairs for the District of Columbia government and directing our city's Sister Cities Program; and

WHEREAS, Ambassador Davis mentored and coached countless women and entrepreneurs, leaders, and diplomats, shaping a generation of U.S. foreign policy professionals; and

WHEREAS, honoring Ambassador Davis today on her 82nd birthday is a fitting tribute to her unwavering commitment to improving lives through the transformative power of diplomacy:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, THE MAYOR OF WASHINGTON, DC, do hereby proclaim May 28, 2025, as a day of remembrance for "CAREER AMBASSADOR RUTH A. DAVIS."
